Helen also is a journalist at Radio Gateshead, on the board of trustees at Age UK North Tyneside, and a resident agony aunt at Pick Me Up! Magazine.

Helen's workshop will include approximately 90 minutes of writing for well-being. This will involve a range of gentle, inclusive writing exercises as well as professional advice to begin your writing journey. Jenna Clake is a poet and writer whose two collections of poetry, Fortune Cookie and Museum of Ice Cream were nominated and

won various prizes.

Jenna's poetry criticism has appeared in illustrious magazines like Poetry London, Poetry School, and Poetry Review. Her debut novel, *Disturbance*, was published in the UK and US.

She lectures in Creative Writing at Teesside University.



Lucy Nichol is a writer with a passion for mental health awareness, music, comedy, and nostalgia. Those themes feature heavily in her three works of

fiction, No Worries if Not!, Parklife and its prequel The Twenty Seven Club. Her first non-fiction book, A Series of Unfortunate Stereotypes - Naming and Shaming Mental Health Stigmas, was published in 2018 and she has recently published her second non-fiction book entitled Snowflake.

Join writers Lucy and Jenna to discuss the process of writing their latest books, exploring mental health in writing and challenging harmful stereotypes around mental well-being.

Neurodiversity workshop with author and illustrator Lauren Osbourne

Lauren Osbourne is a children's book illustrator from South Shields. She has illustrated three wonderful books so far and is now working on several new projects. She

also has written and illustrated her own book It's OK To Be Me, which is all about her experiences as an autistic person. Sharing her experiences with others is very important for Lauren because all she wants is for other

autistic people to see that being yourself is something you should be proud of.

This adult Neurodiversity workshop includes an introduction to Lauren's career and her illustration work; a reading from her book, It's OK To Be Me and a discussion about the messages, emotions, and empathy which can be found in her writing. During the workshop, each participant will be invited to work on a self-portrait, with illustration instruction from Lauren. The author will also welcome questions from the audience on self-publishing and how to generate illustration commissions.

Author Talk - John Pattison

Due to a life of difficult chronic illnesses John retired from his post as Head of Service in Haematology at South Tyneside and Sunderland

NHS Trust. At the age of 18, his parents were told that he would not survive, yet today, he is humbled to be one of the longest living cancer survivors in the UK.

He has recently completed his memoirs, Me, and My Shadow - memoirs of a cancer survivor, which he believes will provide hope and inspiration to society generally, but specifically anyone touched by a cancer diagnosis.

In his talk, John will recount his incredible life journey through his autobiography which is a brutally honest account of one teenager's struggle to understand and deal with the most feared diagnosis known to society: cancer.

Ellie White is an Amazon bestselling selfpublished romance author. She was born and bred in Sunderland and is a proud Mackem!

Since the beginning of her writing career, Ellie has faced countless publishing challenges and has lived through them to tell the tale. In this talk, she'll share the lessons she's learned and, using practical advice, will explain how she now successfully self-publishes her work in a saturated market.

Author talk 'Comics for girls, then and now' by Dr Mel Gibson

Dr Mel Gibson has been working with children, young people, and comics since the mid-1980s. Her book Remembered Reading: Memory, Comics and

Post-War Constructions of British Girlhood looks at comics for girls from the 1950s to early 2000's. Mel is currently an Associate Professor in Childhood Studies at Northumbria University and is interested in both historical and contemporary graphic novels and comics, especially titles aimed at girls.

In her talk, Dr Mel will take us on a journey through time and comic books starting from late twentieth century Britain with beloved Bunty and Jackie to today's comics including fantasy narrative Lumberjanes and superheroes like Ms. Marvel. Because she loves to share her enthusiasm for titles old and new, Mel will also bring along some comics from her own extensive personal collection for the audience to peruse.

Workshop - Discovering the Haiku Moment with Kirsten Cliff Elliot

Kirsten is a writer and librarian from New Zealand. She fell for haiku in 2007 and has been writing and publishing them, along with other Japanese short-

form poetry, ever since.

Some of her haiku have been prize-winning, hundreds have appeared in overseas journals and anthologies, and she was a featured poet in the publication *A New Resonance 8: Emerging Voice in English-Language Haiku*. Kirsten's book *Patient Property: a journey through leukaemia* was shortlisted in the Touchstone Distinguished Books Awards 2019.

Learn the basics of writing modern Englishlanguage haiku with Kirsten's tips and techniques, a shared reading and then practice writing some of your own.

This two-hour workshop includes a ginko (traditional Japanese haiku walk that helps develop your observational skills used to capture the magic of a haiku moment).



Monday 16 October 2–3pm City Library @Museum and Winter Gardens




Marie is a writer and photographer, and author of three local books: Sunderland Industrial Giant, Secret Sunderland, and the newly published

Author Talk - Steve Watson

Steve has investigated over 100 of the alleged most haunted buildings in the UK. His books are based on experiences or stories told to him

over many years working in the paranormal field. As he often says, "I'm not here to prove or disprove the paranormal. I just present our findings and let you decide".

Steve's talk will focus on his book *Paranormal Sunderland* which takes the reader into the world of ghosts and spirits in the city, including ghostly happenings at the North East Land Sea and Air Museum and mysterious sightings at the Phoenix Lodge. These tales of haunted places, supernatural happenings and weird phenomena will delight ghost hunters and intrigue everybody who knows Sunderland and Wearside.

Author talk 'Where did the money go?' - Anthea Lang

Anthea is a published local history author and an experienced family historian. Formerly Local History and Heritage Manager for Gateshead

Council, she now spends her time giving talks, running adult education classes and

writing text to accompany the Alan Godfrey series of old Ordnance Survey maps, including Roker seafront 1914.

In her talk, Anthea will reveal the mystery of her own personal family history which she has spent the last 20 years investigating. If you have carried out your own family history research, then you may have experienced similar conundrums and if you haven't, this talk might encourage you to begin your own ancestry journey.

Author Talk - Margaret Hedley

After retiring early from her job as a Head of Year in a Sunderland secondary school, Margaret set up a research business concentrating on carrying out family

history research for clients all over the world.

Her personal area of expertise focuses on women married to coal miners, mostly in County Durham and this research has been published in two volumes Women of The Durham Coalfield in the 19th Century - Hannah's Story and Women of the Durham Coalfield in the 20th Century -Hannah's Daughter.

As well as carrying out research, Margaret has a range of presentations all related to the Durham coal mining area that she gives to interested groups.

In her talk, Margaret will present to us the incredible hard life of the women in the coal mining communities in the early twentieth century. Their everyday lives were extremely tough with a house and a family to take care of, alongside the emotional demands of the First World War.

Film Screenings and Director Talk - Daniel Appleby

Daniel is a documentary filmmaker based in Sunderland. His film, With All the Will in the World, made it into the official selection for in prestigious Film

Festivals in Munich and Beijing. He was nominated for BFI Network and Film Hub North's Northern Filmmakers Award 2018.

Daniel currently programmes Sunderland Film Club, a documentary-focused community cinema, based at Arts Centre Washington.

This session includes the screening of Daniel's short films (With All the Will in the World which retraces the closing of the last shipyard in Sunderland in 1988 and Elegy for a Working Man which focuses on Town End Farm working men's club). He will also explain how the films were researched and created and will welcome questions from the audience.

'How a Mackem lad became James Herriot' - Dr Rosie Page

Dr Rosie Page is a retired GP from Thirsk in North Yorkshire. Her father was Alf Wight, who became famous as James Herriot, veterinary surgeon and author.

Dr Rosie Page will share her memories of her father, born in Sunderland and raised in Glasgow and how he became the most famous vet in the world who never lost his love of Sunderland, its people and its football club.



Chris has always been an avid reader and loved the idea of writing a book. Having now written two, he is still just as captivated by it all.

When he is not

writing you can usually find him with his wife playing games with their five-year-old daughter, who also seems to have a fascination with books and writes new ones daily.

Chris will be delivering a talk on his book Death in the Theatre which includes the awful incident that became known as the town's 'blackest day' when 183 children lost their lives at the Victoria Hall Theatre.

Chris will also share a less known Sunderland story of the tragic death of a young girl at Sunderland's Lyceum Theatre back in 1865.

Author Talk 'My Music Memories of the 1960's' - lan Mole

lan was born and raised in Sunderland but has spent most of his life in London working mainly as a teacher of English to overseas students and as a

tour guide. He is the London correspondent for the SAFC fanzine 'A Love Supreme' and the guide for the Official Shipyard Girls Walking Tour. The talk will concentrate on the importance of music to the author and how he discovered many great bands via his brother's small record collection, Radio Luxembourg and various BBC shows.

He'll recall how he used his pocket money to buy records at Atkinson's and will also share with us his live music memories with shows like The Beatles at the Empire in 1963 and later many other groups including The Who, Free and The Bonzos.

'What's In A Name?: Street Names of Sunderland' with Stuart Miller

Stuart was a Senior Lecturer at the University of Sunderland then Director of Continuing Education.

Following a brief period at the

University of Northumbria he went on to work as Project Manager and currently tutor for the Workers' Education Association. He has written various articles and books on aspects of local, regional, and national history.

He is also a volunteer with the Wearside Field Club and the Donnison School.

This illustrated talk will cover the fascinating research process which volunteers have undertaken to uncover the origin and mysteries behind some of our familiar street names.

Stuart will present to the audience some examples of the street-names which figure in the popular book which is now in its third reprint.

The age categories are: 5-9 years, 10-13 years and 14-18 years

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'Trashy Novels and Heroic Deeds' by Prof Angela Smith

Professor Angela Smith is based in the English team at the University of Sunderland. She has published widely, specialising in the area of gender and sexuality studies, media discourse and politeness theory. With Sunderland Culture, she manages the Rebel Women of Sunderland project.




Teenage workshop: Hone your writing with Haiku
